

Violence

Supporting people whose lives are impacted by all forms of violence and trauma, our programs provide crisis intervention, shelter, affordable housing, counselling, advocacy and non-judgmental emotional and practical support. Trained professional staff assist in clients' recovery, helping to rebuild their lives and help to establish positive connections in the community.

Services

Family-centred, inclusive programs promote active participation and provide pregnant women, parents, caregivers and children with the support needed to ensure all children have a good start in life. We also provide programs in prevention, intervention and support for families who have children with a developmental delay or diagnosed disability.

Services

Individual and group counselling is provided for families, children, youth, and adults using a collaborative approach, which builds on the client's strengths and helps to develop positive relationships to ensure the client remains at the centre of the work done. Our partner Arrowhead Clubhouse Society also provides programs for adults with mental health challenges.

Our vision is to create a caring community. Through the Food Bank, Better at Home for seniors, the Visitor Information Centre, Welcoming Communities for new immigrants, the Volunteer Centre and our partners like the Community Resource Centre, we provide opportunities for people to help people in our community in very meaningful ways.

DID YOU KNOW?

- 48% of Police-Based Victim Services files were related to domestic violence. There was an 82% increase in referrals to this program over the same time period in the previous year.
- Yew Transition House sheltered 55 women and 31 children, and received 872 calls to its 24 hour access line.
- The Children Who Witness Abuse program supported 13 families.
- 120 people attended the Jackson Katz talk on May 12, 2015 to hear about the 'bystander' model of mentorship to be introduced to our local high schools to help end violence against women in our community.

In 2014

- 278 families and 160 pregnant and new mothers were helped through our Parent-Tot Drop-In and Bellies and Babies programs.
- 2,900 referrals were provided to families through the Child Care Resource and Referral program.
- Supported Child and Infant Development carried over 160 cases.
- · Occupational and Physiotherapy therapists carried over 150 cases.

- Arrowhead Clubhouse Society provides programs for life skills that support self-efficacy for adults with mental health challenges.

DID YOU KNOW?

In 2014

- 1/3 of SC Food Bank clients were children and an increasing number of clients were over 60.
- Volunteers distributed 12,123 bags of food, an average of 1,011 bags per month.
- Over 14,000 visitors pass through our Visitor Centre annually.
- From July September 2014 3741 people visited the Volunteer Opportunities web page and 384 volunteer positions were promoted.
- The Better at Home program, in its third year, has provided clients with 967 friendly visits, made 947 trips to the grocery store or local appointments, and has contributed 2,871 volunteer hours to help seniors to date.
